Urban Comfort Foods

It may be the season of elaborate holiday meals, but the culinary arts are always in full swing in Spark at Midtown's teaching kitchen. Thanks to the wonderful partnership of Urban Comfort Foods, residents have had the opportunity to participate in 11 monthly cooking classes, making gourmet meals with the expert instruction of chefs Maxarine and Jinell.

Urban Comfort Foods is a South LA-based business, founded by two local mothers working to fight food insecurity, provide nutritious and affordable dining options, and make gourmet meals accessible to everyone in the community.

With the support of Maxarine and Jinell, residents at the Spark have cooked dishes ranging from vegan pizza to jerk chicken pasta, using fresh, nutritious ingredients to create healthy, well-balanced meals. Residents who can't attend classes in person can even watch a YouTube video of the class and receive a home cooked meal for four people delivered to their door. Discovery Club Gets a Running Start



A new program is up and running at City Gardens Apartments! The Discovery Club gives young residents the chance to decide what they want to 'discover' themselves, offering new educational and artistic activities every Friday. Thanks to resources donated by Active Discovery, a local organization that aims to partner physical activity with literacy-based games, residents at City Gardens have had new opportunities to learn and explore while staying active.

Discovery Club aims to work with younger residents who may not have the opportunity to attend homework club or who have difficulty focusing on academics in a sit-down environment for long periods of time. To engage these students and help them learn, the program incorporates activity-based learning projects. For instance, Active Discovery donated The Travel Game, which allows the students to roll a large foam die and move across US cities on a map. Each city comes with a QR code, where students can research facts about the area and follow a link to a video demonstrating group exercises that the students can try.

Resident feedback was crucial to getting this program off the ground, so Field Supervisor Clare Ofield gathered ideas and suggestions from students in the After School Program prior to implementing Discovery Club. Students suggested a long list of wonderful ideas, including how to use tjanting tools to create Batik wax resistant artwork!

Thanks to the wonderful support of Active Discovery and the fantastic suggestions of our youngest residents, Discovery Club is providing active learning opportunities for resident students.

Growing Community at The Nightingale

At The Nightingale in South Los Angeles, one resident has planted seedlings from his home country in order to grow community at his new home. Mr. Leonard was born and raised in Jamaica and often visits the community room to share stories of his childhood and family history; his warm tales are always met with open ears.

One day, Mr. Leonard spoke of tending to his garden in Jamaica, where all his siblings helped their mother plant and maintain the flowers and vegetables. Sharing this story inspired Mr. Leonard to research the viability of planting similar seedlings in California with Resident Services Coordinator Cassandra Mesa. Soon, he found a reputable source for the Callaloo plant, a green leafy vegetable only found in Jamaica and often added to traditional dishes. Mr. Leonard was ecstatic, and the pair immediately ordered an envelope of seeds to begin planting.

Each day, Mr. Leonard came down to the community room to check if the seeds had arrived yet. As he waited, he shared tips with other residents about planting and caring for other new additions to the community garden. After a few weeks of patience and a careful list of preparations, the seeds arrived and Mr. Leonard was able to fill a small garden box. Now, the Callaloo sprouts are nearly ready to be transplanted to the main community garden.


