Next month, Spark at Midtown in Long Beach and Springhaven in Willowbrook will be opening apartment doors to low-income residents, including those who have experienced homelessness. Ralph arrived at The Nightingale with nothing but a bag of clothes. It had been a long journey through imprisonment, grief, addiction, homelessness, and hospitalization before he arrived at one of Linc Housing's supportive housing communities: The Nightingale in unincorporated Los Angeles County.

Once Ralph was told that he had been accepted he couldn't believe his luck. On move-in day he found that the apartment was already fully furnished and thanks to

Linc's Welcome Home program, filled with the basic day to day necessities that he really needed. He was in awe that anyone would be this kind towards him.

Since moving into The Nightingale, Ralph has enjoyed stable, supportive housing for the first time in his adult life. Freed from the constant struggle and survival of homelessness, he has become a very active member in the community and is now a familiar friendly face at weekly groups and special events. Under Construction: HiFi Collective

Last year Los Angeles County unveiled new mapping technology that showed unsheltered homeless populations in places like Historic Filipinotown exceeded more than 500 individuals experiencing homelessness per square mile. That puts it in the same range as Downtown Los Angeles, which has traditionally had the highest homeless counts.

Linc Housing is part of the solution in Historic Filipino town with HiFi Collective, a 64-unit supportive housing community for those who have experienced homelessness. Our HiFi construction team has completed the demolition of the previous structure, excavated the site, and poured concrete for the foundation. In construction terms, this is an important milestone!

Not only will this new building provide desperately needed, high-quality housing and a wide range of social and supportive services; it will also include a new beautiful ground floor facility for Search to Involve Pilipino Americans (SIPA). SIPA, which has served the local neighborhood since 1972, will use this community center to promote economic self-sufficiency, educational attainment, cultural awareness and civic engagement.
